Smith 1941 Mulvihill Winner

In late Spring of 2022, SDO club member John Swain gave me a generous gift of a Smith 1941 Mulvihill Winner kit from Campbell's Custom Kits. This model is essentially an overgrown Gollywock. There is a rumor that Mr. Smith got permission from Wally Simmers, the designer the famous Gollywock, to create a larger version for the Mulvihill event. That event is the oldest rubber powered free flight event in the United States. The 100-year anniversary of the Mulvihill event was held at the 2023 AMA outdoor Nats in Muncie last month. The rules of the event are pretty simple. The free flight model must be rubber powered and must have a projected wing area under 300 square inches. The Smith Mulvihill has a low aspect ratio wing with a span of 35 ¼-inch and an area of around 190 square inches. I plan to fly my Smith Mulvihill fly with a 10 x ¼-inch rubber motor that weighs 60 grams. Max launch torque will be 80 inch-ounces! In July of 2022 I completed the fuselage, but then I did not recommence work on my Mulvihill build until a year later. The picture below shows how far I have gotten as of August 3, 2023.

The wing and tail feathers of my Smith Mulvihill are covered with red and yellow Esaki tissue that was shrunk and finished with a 30/70 mixture of Eze Dope and water. I think a tissue covered model finished with thinned Nitrate dope produces a better-looking model but my wife does not appreciate the smell of nitrate dope and thinner. The fuselage will be covered with Polyspan fabric which is light and tough. However, Polyspan fabric does not like to go around curves. I will spray the fuselage with yellow Design Master spray paint to make it waterproof.

Both the fuselage and the wing of my Smith Mulvihill are separable into two sections, and the fin unplugs from the stab. This will allow me to transport my Smith Mulvihill in one of my standard 31 x 12 x 6-inch plastic boxes. I wrote a detailed article about how I sectioned the fuselage which was published in the July 2022 edition of this newsletter. The wing sections are joined by segments of 1/16-inch music wire that extend from the root rib of one wing section and plug into 3/32-inch Brass tube segments buried in the other wing section. I was warned that carbon fiber rod joiners in the wing sections of large F1A gliders can break.


The Superior Props 16-inch folding prop has very wide blades per the plan and was custom manufactured by Volare Products. I have carved many balsa props and made a number of folding props. However, I think George Bredehoft does a better job and he sure saved me a lot of time. I had to sand the blades a lot to get them down to an appropriate thinness.

I installed a fuselage support extender on my winding stooge which I clamped to my workbench. When I mounted my Smith Mulvihill fuselage on the extended stooge it fit perfectly.




Test Winding of Smith Mulvihill

I lubed a 10 x ½-inch rubber motor and installed it in the fuselage using my new extra-long stuffer stick. I made a 31-inch long, 1-inch diameter Aluminum blast tube with a bayonet lock on its rear end. I used a very long extractor that I previously made for my large Korda C model. The Crocket hook had to be replaced with a different style of hook that has a two-part screw together bobbin. The Crocket hook would not slide onto the 1/16-inch OD prop hook due to its sharp radius near the end that engages the stop screw. With only 150 turns the prop was locked. So, I screwed in the stop screw several times until the prop would spin and lock up with about 25-30 turns remaining. My final test wind was 400 turns and 20 inch-ounces and the prop run was smooth and the prop locking action took place when desired. The prop blades need a waterproof finish and some hooks for small rubber bands that will ensure complete folding. I also need to drill a hole in the nose block for a Brass tube to accept a prop locking pin. I will insert this pin to allow me to safely remove the fuselage from the stooge after the rubber motor has been fully wound.

My Mulvihill will carry a Pyxis GPS locator transmitter, and an RDT. I want to be able to retrieve this model. I also want to be able to DT my Smith Mulvihill when it starts getting into trouble. I think I may have bitten off more than I can chew. Winding a rubber motor to 60-80 inches ounces of torque, and then coupling the prop assembly will be like wrestling an alligator!

FAMOUS ORBITEER DOMINATES HLG AT THE 2023 INDOOR NATIONALS

The scene: Idaho, Moscow, The Kibbie Dome (145 ft ceiling). The Man: Tim Batiuk (73 years young).

The effort: Two years of more than 100 pullups a day, lots of specialized pool exercise, strict diet, producing a lean muscular body and mind. Very many days of early rising to practice launching indoor models before the thermals appear at Perris

The models: HAR36 and BB40. These are very high aspect ratio designs developed to launch highest, have great transitions to glide, and to circle tightly but safely.

Tim took no time at all to master the building while others struggled. For the AMA HLG event, wings have to be less than 100 sq, in., Tim put up 3 great flights then watched to see if any competitor would make him throw again. They tried their best. Lots of LOUD grunting and yelling but none of these decades younger macho men could push Tim.

Over the last two days an unlimited HLG event, F1N, took place. Tim used his BB40, the 40 standing for its 40" span. Tim's son, also Tim, had shown up and was able to witness his father's deserved success. The young bucks could not come anywhere close to Tim's times. He out threw everyone by a TON, despite all of their yelling, throwing their bodies about with maximum effort. Tim was throwing at least 120 ft high with total control. He achieved 3 flights over 90 seconds each, with at least one over 93 seconds. Less than a handful of people, IN THE WORLD, have ever achieved this, and ALL of them were decades younger! BE VERY PROUD OF YOUR ORBITEER.








