This month's column is hard for me to write. The words do not come easy. As some may know Orbiteer member and long time Scale Staffel president John Hutchison has caught his final thermal. John left us over the Thanksgiving holiday and news of his parting for me was a shock as he seemed to be in good spirits when I saw him at our September board meeting. John built beautiful models that looked as good as they flew as was exhibited by his award of the Flying Aces Blue Max and many monthly and year end awards and trophies from the Orbiteers. John was a highly skilled builder and competitive flyer, yet he always had time to assist those of us who were having problems with our planes.

No matter who the club member or guest was, he was always interested in seeing their newly built planes at the flying field. It went like this. "What's that you got (insert name). Bring it over so I can get a look at it." John would start by saying, "That's a cutie." Then, taking it in his hands he would eye it carefully for alignments and provide feedback if he saw anything askew. "How's it flying?" Then you'd do a hand wound test flight while John observed. After the test John might offer... "You might need, nose weight, downthrust, right thrust, right rudder, check your stab tilt, try a shim under the stab." He had a knack for taming a temperamental plane. He did this though the plane he helped you sort out might eventually outfly his. He was competitive but enjoyed seeing others do their best. He will be missed. Our sincere condolences go out to his wife Kathy, his son Greg who is also an Orbiteer and their extended family.

Our December 17 make-up contest is the last chance to pick up points for the 2023 award season. Be on alert for an email or other announcement of the feature event (P-30, Coupe or OT/Nostalgia) for that date. I'm bringing along my Guillows Arrow for some fun flying. It's the perfect plane for Xmas holiday flying with its green fuselage and rudder with a red wing and stab. For a Guillows kit, it builds up to be a very consistent flyer. I think if built light enough and without landing gear, it might even compete in P-30.

We had a good turnout for our November P-30 event with eight flyers competing for the top prize. The first flight in the P-30 event was a mass launch the time for which counted as a flier's first flight. Great to see all those P-30s in fast climb. We had quite a few junior flyers on the field competing in glider events. Some of the older juniors were flying gliders a lot more sophisticated than I would be able to build and fly. Great to see those young fliers out there. Gives me hope that the flame of free flight will continue burning into the future.

On November 29, several Orbiteers volunteered to time the AMA Alpha flights of Gary Fogel's SDSU Aeronautical Engineering (AE123) students. Students were divided into groups of 20 for up to six rounds of timed flights. Flying action was fast and furious, with up to ten or more planes in the air at one time. Timers needed to keep a keen eye on their designated flyer. I know because I was there and had a ball as a timer watching the students fly and cheering for their classmates as they launched. Some flyers in my group were getting into the 30 to 40 second range. May not sound impressive but for beginners that's not bad. My take on the AMA Alpha is that it's easy to build but not as good a performer as the old AMA Delta Dart which I have built and flown and found to be a reliable flyer but maybe a more difficult build for a rank beginner. I hope the students had as good a time flying their Alphas as I had timing and watching. At the conclusion of the event students had the option to turn in their planes and timers that would then be used by students in Ronny Espolt's junior flying classes as preparation for Science Olympiad competition. As I turned in my timer's sheet, I saw the donated planes and winders in cardboard boxes. Based on what I saw, it looked like Ronny would be getting a good inventory.

Regarding the topic of what you don't know may confuse you. I recently read Vance Gilbert's musings in the Nov-Dec 2023 Flying Aces Club News. His musings on the sesquiplane caught my interest. Why? I did not know that my Nieuport 17 was NOT a biplane. It is according to definition a sesquiplane. What is a sesquiplane you ask, it's a plane whose lower wing is less than 50% of the area of its main (upper wing). So, does this mean I'm unable to fly in WWI mass launches because I don't have a biplane? Vance muses... "If you have to struggle to figure out if it's a biplane- IT'S NOT A BIPLANE". No struggle here. My Nieuport is a biplane. I don't care if the lower wing looks a little smaller.

We're coming up on year 2024 and our annual banquet in January. Keep your eye on email and the El Torbellino for details. As usual there will be a raffle and attendees are encouraged to bring along new or gently used modelling items (kit, book, etc.) for the raffle. As in the past both clubs, the Orbiteers and Scale Staffel will contribute matching funds for some great prizes. The raffle is not limited to club members, so come one, come all and bring the whole family. Good food, great company and swag (prizes) that will make your eyes as big as saucers!


John Hutchison -

In Memory of John Hutchison *By Mike Jester*

On November 23, 2023, Thanksgiving Day, John Hutchison passed away peacefully at his San Diego home with his wife, Kathy, and his family at his side. He was a 2012 inductee into the FAC Hall of Fame. John had been battling some serious health issues for several years. Our hobby lost a true free flight legend when we lost "Hutch" as he was affectionately known to his friends. Starting around age ten John built and flew just about every type of model airplane imaginable but ultimately settled on free flight model airplanes as his passion. Along with Walt Mooney, John founded FAC Squadron 41, the SCALE STAFFEL SQUADRON, which was the first FAC squadron in California. John was the CO of that squadron for decades and was the CD of most of its contests, and several of the WESTFAC contests. John was the first FAC member in California to win the BLUE MAX award. He could have won many more Kanones but unselfishly served as the CD at many FAC contests, thereby giving up a tremendous amount of his own contest flying time. John was also active in the San Diego Orbiteers free flight club since at least as early as 1978. He continued building, flying, and mentoring both indoor and outdoor model airplane events for the next 45 years. John could build, trim, and fly any model well, but his favorite event was FAC Rubber Scale. He was always available to give advice and materials to anyone in our hobby. I personally met John in 2002 when, as coach of my daughter's Science Olympiad Wright Stuff team, we sought assistance from the Orbiteers club. With John's expert advice, she won several gold medals in the Wright Stuff event at regional and state Science Olympiad competitions.



Hence, the formation of the San Diego Scale Staffels club and Flying Aces Squadron 41. He resided as President of the club from the get-go till earlier this year. He was the recipient of the distinguish FAC Blue Max award for reaching 16 kills (1st Places) in competition. If I'm not mistaking, the first one on the West Coast to receive the award. He's also, in the FAC Hall of Fame. Wow, that's a star to hang your hat on.

So many more examples I could elaborate on, but I think you got the idea of who this man was to all of us. For Arline and I, we will miss a wonderful friendship. Good bye John.

Review of the Orbiteer newsletter archive shows John being active in the club with his son since 1978. He also earned the Orbiteer of the Year in 1978 as well. In the years 1982 thru 2000, John served the club as Vice President for many years, and was club president in 1994. During this time period John also supported the Indoor flying program, by organizing the Indoor Flying conducted after the monthly club business meetings.

John's interest in Free Flight covered the entire spectrum of Power, Non-Power, HL Glider, and Indoor.

Other areas of club support that John took on included, securing the use of the Grossmount College site for indoor flying, supporting the Science Olympiad program thru the years, and was Contest Director for numerous Monthly Outdoor Contests for the Orbiteers.

Another model airplane club that John participated in, is the Scale Staffel Flying Aces Scale model airplane club. He served as club president for as long as I can remember. When competing in Flying Aces Scale contests, you can earn 1 kanone for each confirmed contest victory. After 16 confirmed victories in contest flying you are awarded the coveted "BLUE MAX MEDAL." John was awarded the "Blue Max Medal" fairly recently for his excellence in Scale model flying.

John's support of the Orbiteers and the Scale Staffel model clubs will be missed!

ORBITEERS NOVEMBER 26TH CONTEST DAY

First at the field, having left the mountains east of San Diego at 4:30am, I arrived at 6:40am. Cool but calm, the weather that is, there was a lot to unload before flying. Others began arriving in anticipation of the P-30 mass launch scheduled for 8:30am. This was pushed back to 8:40am so that all that wanted to could participate. Mike Pykelny found that he had a broken stab mount, always something, dang, so he graciously ran the launching for this event. And a fine job he did, giving us a full minute warning, then 30 sec, and finally THREE, TWO, ONE, LAUNCH!

Eight hopeful souls, having pushed their best motors to the limit, without breaking, shoved their models upward. THE AIR WAS TERRIBLE DOWN. Even so no one crashed, most having proper climbs, a few getting fairly high. The eventual winner, Stan's ancient AirShark design, was not the highest – at first. At least 2 great P-30 fliers climbed higher by the end of their motor runs. But the AirShark was not done unwinding. It was using a printed prop, deemed legal since it was commercally available. This prop is ugly, having lots of uneven plastic. Also it seems to have ugly undercamber, and too much of it. But having arrived in the mail as a gift, the only honorable thing to do was to try it. Hmm, it may be better. It stretched Stan's normal 45 to 50 sec motor run to 65 seconds. As the highest models began gliding down, the AirShark continued climbing and those higher models lost all of their advantage. Now just a matter of glide, and the AirShark glides very well, plus trim. This AirShark had very little turn built in, and may have glided out of the worst part of the air.

What a beautiful morning for this mass launch, all participents seemed to be having a great time. Several people continued to do well in the rest of the P-30 event, maxing out on the rest of their flights.

As for hand launch glider, we all know that Tim is going to win. But this time he let someone else win, which happened to be Stan. No joke, Tim let him win. Tim spent so much time helping the kids that he had just a few minutes left to put in his third max, and no time left for a flyoff flight. This let Stan win with just a 46 sec flyoff. Others made great launches and had real chances to win. Chris Reck was back after a long layoff due to injury, and was flying very well. Some of you may remember Harrison, a young man, also back out after a year long layoff. He did not enter but was throwing gangbusters. The young star,

Results of the 2023 Dual-clubs Free Flight Bonanza A National Cup Event

November 10-12, 2022 LOST HILLS, CA

The Dual-Club Free Flight Bonanza is the joint annuals for the San Diego Orbiteers and Fresno Gas Model Clubs. This was the 64th and 83rd annuals respectively for the clubs. Having dual club participation in waning attendance significantly reduces the overhead cost to put on a successful event. It has worked well over the past 20 years. This is the 3rd year sharing the field with the Patterson FAI contest. It worked well last year and it again worked well this year. Even better.

Arline and I arrived on the Lost Hills field Thursday and met up with Brian Van Nest, CD of the Patterson FAI contest. We worked out the location for our contests and proceeded to set up. The weather forecast for the weekend was cool and mild wind. Turned out to be the best 3 days of FF contest weather that I've experienced in the 35 year I've been competing at Lost Hills. Bright sun, high 60's, calm to 3mph wind. A few 5mph gusts and light thermals. Very competitive conditions.

This was our inaugural 3-day event. We created a schedule that allowed the majority of the events to be flown any day, but once you started, you had to finish the same day. There we a few scheduled events; such as, Mass launches and Vintage FAI. The scheduled Friday noontime 1-hour break for lunch and the now famous Ice Cream Social during the break continues to be a favorite. Leftover ice cream and condiments are giving to the local Lost Hills Fire Department. The tradition also lived on for the very well attended Saturday night Food Fest. Both special events are the courtesy of the Dual-clubs.

Overall participation was 36, broken down to 33 Sr/Open and 3 Juniors. Up from last year. Flyers outside of California came from Oregon, Utah, Neveda and Arizona. Always good to see some new faces. This is encouraging. The hobby still has life.

Special thanks to Orbiteers Arline Bartick and Linda Piazzi; Fresno GMC Doss Porter, Gail Porter and Nancy Day who spent a great deal of time at the CD table registering folks, recording times and helping with the Ice Cream Social and Food Fest. This gave me an opportunity to participate in the competition. Last but not least, thank you Fresno GMC David Martin for manning the grill and SCAMP Dan Heinrich who provided shelter and electrical power for the Food Fest. I can't express more gratitude for their help. Arline also handles the camera duty. She has honed her action shots to perfection. Furthermore, she culls out individual shots of flyers and shares the pictures with them via email.

Highlight of the contest: The most contested event again this year was A/B Nostalgia with 14 entries. The Gold went to Glen Schneider (Doc) with a total of 1073 seconds, beating out Don McNamee with 1027 seconds and Randy Secor with 1006 seconds. C Nostalgia, A & B AMA gas were next with 7 each. Tristan Mayer was the top Junior with a total of 708 seconds in P-30 beating out his brother Mason and Henry Kruse. Probably the most unusual event was in the P-30 Mass Launch when 30 seconds into the mass flight, my P-30 had its prop come off. Turn out to be a Gizmo Geezer failure.


